Overdue for a Change, Library Checks Out New Options

CHALLENGE

The Fayette County Public Library is about 40 miles south of Atlanta, but it is miles ahead of its contemporaries when it comes to facilities and programs. Even so, the building turned a few decades old not long ago and was beginning to show a bit of wear. Packed with more than 130,000 volumes, along with DVDs, CDs and other reference materials, the library does not suffer for resources. What it was in need of is a bit of refreshment. When the library director decided to begin by focusing on one particular room, the challenge was clear: how to transform a room packed with cantilever shelving, aging worktables and a lack of seating into something worthy of checking out.

SOLUTION

Sometimes, the right solution is as much about "re-imagining" a space as it is reinvesting in products for the space. Often times, it's a balance of both. By asking the right questions and being able to elicit clear answers, Patterson Pope helped clarify the library's ambitions. The space, known as "The Georgia Room," was brought up to date with a mixture of furniture selections from KI, re-purposed media tables, refinished worktables, and re-invigorated storage shelves and cabinets.
